Vice Chair Report – Dale Wagoner	Mr. Wagoner has rotated off the Board, and is not in attendance. Therefore, there is no report.	
Chief Deputy Commissioner, Public Health and Preparedness – David H. Trump, MD, MPH, MPA	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> • Dr. Trump welcomed everyone and thanked them for their service. He welcomed the new Board members and recognized the work of the State EMS Advisory Board and its importance to the VDH, the EMS community and the Commonwealth of Virginia. 	
Office of EMS Report – Gary Brown, Scott Winston and Staff	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> • Mr. Brown welcomed the new Board members. The Office of EMS had an orientation for the new Board members Thursday night. Mr. Brown said that all of the presentations given last night will be put on the OEMS website. He encouraged the new board members to feel free to contact the Office of EMS with any questions. New members were reminded to complete the Committee Interest forms and return them to the Office of EMS. • Mr. Brown announced the tentative meeting dates for 2015 and 2016. <ul style="list-style-type: none"> ○ In 2015 – The Thursday and Friday tentative meeting dates are: <ul style="list-style-type: none"> ▪ February 5-6; May 7-8; August 6-7; and at the Symposium on Wednesday, November 11, 2015. ○ In 2016 – The Thursday and Friday tentative meeting dates are: <ul style="list-style-type: none"> ▪ February 4-5; May 5-6; August 4-5; and at the Symposium on Wednesday, November 9, 2016. • Mr. Brown informed Board members that their registration fee for the Symposium is waived, and they also will receive one night’s lodging since the November board meeting is held in conjunction with the Symposium. Board members will receive an email with the Symposium registration link. • National Ambulance Standards Update – Michael Berg <ul style="list-style-type: none"> ○ Mr. Berg updated the group on the General Services Administration (GSA) Change Notice #6 for the federal ambulance specifications, the KKK Specs. He explained about the Change Notice and told them there will probably be a Change Notice #7 coming in the near future that will include the requirement for the cot retention systems. Mr. Berg also gave the Board information on other ambulance standards that are being revised and updated. Mr. Berg explained the relevance of the ambulance standards to Virginia EMS; most notably the fact that the current KKK Standards are scheduled to be retired in October of 2015. 	<p>Mr. Berg said that the OEMS website will have two presentations regarding studies on ambulance crashes and equipment and ambulance designs for the future.</p>

He reported that the State EMS Plan and the Virginia Emergency Medical Services Regulations were both approved by the Board of Health at this meeting.

Executive Committee – Gary Critzer	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> • Mr. Critzer reported that the Committee met yesterday. The meeting was very informal since only two members are left, (Matt Tatum and he), All other members have rotated off the State EMS Advisory Board. 	

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	<p>Items discussed included:</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> • A Bylaw change – The Bylaw change document was distributed to the board members today and will be discussed during new business. • They also discussed the recent EMS Advisory Board appointments. • Criminal Background Checks - They discussed concerns that have been raised throughout the EMS community in regards to criminal background checks. Mr. Berg and he will be meeting with a representative from Virginia State Police to see if they can resolve some of the issues. • Mobile Integrated Healthcare Group (Community Paramedicine) - Mr. Critzer is putting together a multidisciplinary group to look at the concept of Mobile Integrated Healthcare (Community Paramedicine) and determine how EMS in Virginia can work with the Virginia healthcare industry to develop a working Community Paramedicine environment in Virginia. The group will consist of about 14 multidisciplinary members. He still has to solicit a few members to complete composition of the group. 	
Financial Assistance Review Committee – Robert Trimmer	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> • Mr. Trimmer reported that the committee met yesterday. They did not have quorum and therefore could not conduct business. • The new E-Gift Program, a web-based program, opened on August 1 for grant submissions. Also, the new grant cycle opened on August 1. Guidelines are available explaining how to decrease on-going cash balances. In the next cycle, if you are awarded a grant on January 1 the money needs to be committed by March 1 so that the money can be paid out during the same fiscal year and there are no carryover balances. 	
Administrative Coordinator – Gary Samuels Rules and Regulations Committee - Ed Rhodes Legislative and Planning	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> • Gary Samuels had no report as the Administrative Coordinator • Mr. Rhodes reported that the committee met on Thursday. The biggest topic of the meeting was in regards to the criminal background checks and the upcoming planned meetings with VSP to try and fix the concerns. • Regulatory Issues – Mike Berg <ul style="list-style-type: none"> Mr. Berg gave an update on the current regulatory packets. <ul style="list-style-type: none"> ○ Fast Track Packet for Practitioner’s Signature – Still in the Governor’s office awaiting signatures. There is no timeline when it will be signed. ○ Fast Track Packet Regarding Technical Changes to the Financial Assistance language in the Regulations - This packet is in the Attorney General’s office awaiting their review. ○ Regulations Packet Word Change– The word “affiliation” needs to be added back into Section 910 of the EMS Regulations. That word was somehow left out in the last revision of the Regulations. This packet has been sent to VDH Administration and is awaiting their review. Mr. Berg has asked VDH Administration if the Commissioner could sign this packet on behalf of the Board of Health to expedite that regulatory process. • Mr. Logan reported that the committee met earlier in the day. They discussed three major 	

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<p>Committee – Rob Logan</p>	<p>issues.</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> ○ Code Language Clean Up Bill. The committee developed a workgroup to look at and work on the language. The group has met four times over the last several months. They have developed a document that is now ready for public comment period. Mr. Logan explained that the intent of the bill is technical to clean up wording, antiquated references and inconsistencies and it is not a policy document. The goal is to have this document move through the process without amendment during the legislative session. Mr. Logan said the one issue that could prove controversial is the definition for emergency medical services that is proposed to be changed to accommodate mobile integrated healthcare. He said it is possible that the home health industry might oppose that change. <p>Mr. Logan explained that the workgroup did not receive the final draft bill language from legislative services until yesterday. Because the group needs to give it a thorough review, the committee action earlier today was to approve the document in its current form subject to a 10-day review period. If there are no substantial suggested changes from the committee within that 10-day review period then the document will be put out for public comment. It will be available on the OEMS website and widely distributed for the EMS constituents to discuss and review.</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> ○ HB1010 (2014) – Mr. Logan said the committee recognizes the importance of addressing the issues of the recruitment and retention study which came out of the last session of the General Assembly and has already been mentioned for the upcoming session. He said the committee feels it will come back up and the EMS community needs to be prepared to address the issue with the General Assembly if the bill is re-introduced. 	<p>The Legislative and Planning Committee recognizes the need of involving the home health care industry and has extended an invitation to the Executive Director of the Hospice and Home Healthcare Association for their representative to become a part of the sworkgroup.</p>
<p>Infrastructure Coordinator / Transportation Committee – Matt Tatum</p> <p>Communications Committee – Gary Critzer</p>	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> ● Mr. Tatum said he has no report as the Infrastructure Coordinator. ● Mr. Tatum reported that the Transportation Committee met a couple of weeks ago in conjunction with the EMS Provider Health and Safety Committee. There were two presentations set up by OEMS from two national offices that have been doing work on ambulance crashes, safety in ambulances and the stretcher retention system. They were outstanding presentations that gave a lot of information. ● Mr. Critzer reported that the committee met earlier in the day. They had two items, neither which require action from the State EMS Advisory Board. <ul style="list-style-type: none"> ○ Virginia Beach Public Safety Answering Point Center (PSAP) Accreditation Application was reviewed and approved. ○ Changes were made in the accreditation process to lengthen it from a two to a three year process. <p>There next meeting will be at the Symposium in November.</p>	<p>The presentations will be placed on the OEMS website.</p>

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Emergency Management Committee – David Hoback	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> • Mr. Hoback reported that the committee met on Thursday. They did not have any action items. <ul style="list-style-type: none"> ○ Triage Tags – A Request for Proposal (RFP) to solicit bids for triage tags is ready to be released. They will be printing 187,000 tags, and the tags will be distributed to EMS agencies based on their number of licensed vehicles and the balance will be distributed to EMS agencies. The committee is looking at cooperative language within the RFP that would allow an agency to purchase the tags directly from a vendor. However, Mr. Hoback cautioned that vendors may require a purchase minimum for the tags. ○ Inventory Management Software Solution – Mr. Hoback said there is an initiative being looked at in partnership with the Department of Emergency Management, Office of EMS, the Department of Fire Program, and the Hospital and Healthcare Association to look at a software solution to manage specialty EMS equipment and vehicles and to look at what resources are available in Virginia. Currently, this information is kept by “pen and paper.” This software will allow mapping of the resource and its location and assist with emergency deployments. 	
Patient Care Coordinator – Allen Yee, MD Medical Direction Committee – Marilyn McLeod, MD Medevac Committee – Anita Perry	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> • Dr. Yee did not have a report as Patient Care Coordinator. • Dr. McCloud reported that the Medical Direction Committee met in July. The committee did not have any action items. Most of the discussion at the meeting was in regards to the FARC grants and also about physicians accessing information via VPHIB. The committee has on its agenda for their next meeting to discuss and come up with a document on why they disagree with HB1010. • The committee met on Thursday morning. Mr. Critzer attended the meeting and presented a Medevac response plan that he has implemented in Central Shenandoah EMS council region. The plan focuses on the appropriate and safe dispatch of air medical teams. The committee members were challenged to carry this or similar plans back to their regions for implementation. They are hopeful that by the November meeting some other regions will have started work on Medevac Response Plans in their areas. • The committee is beginning work on a project focused on ground versus air transport times for some key cardiac patients. They plan to start this project by October 1. This data will be shared as it becomes available. • The committee is continuing to follow dispatch centers and referring hospitals that seem to be “weather shopping.” They now send letters to the dispatch centers or hospitals that they feel are “weather shopping.”

He opened the floor for discussion and hearing none he called for the vote.</p> <p>Mr. Oliver presented the second motion from the committee for a vote by the State EMS Advisory Board in regards to the Experiential I-99 Allowed Competencies.</p> <p> Appendix C _3_.pdf</p> <p>Mr. Critzer said that again since the motion is coming from a committee it does not require a second. He opened the floor for discussion and hearing none called for a vote.</p> <p>The third motion presented by Mr. Oliver was in regards to CE Revision Proposal. Mr. Oliver explained that the National Registry is revising its continuing education requirements to become effective in 2016. He explained the components of the motion which can be seen in Appendix B in the Quarterly Report.</p> <p> Appendix B (2).pdf</p> <p>Mr. Critzer said the motion does not require a second since it comes from a committee. Mr. Critzer opened the floor for discussion.</p>	<p>MOTION: The State EMS Advisory Board moves to accept the proposed RN to Paramedic competencies document.</p> <p>YEAS = 22; NAYS = 0; ABSTENTIONS = 0</p> <p>The motion was carried unanimously.</p> <p>MOTION: The State EMS Advisory Board moves to accept the Experiential Learning Document.</p> <p>YEAS = 21; NAYS = 0; ABSTENTIONS = 0</p> <p>The motion was carried unanimously.</p> <p>MOTION: The State EMS Advisory Board moves to accept the proposed continuing education hours for providers to recertify in Virginia when the Registry implements their new hours in 2016 and Virginia Providers wishing to maintain their National Registry must meet the minimum hours as set by the National Registry.</p>

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	<p>There was extensive discussion and questions asked in regards to this motion. A lot of the discussion was in regards to the changes in the hours.</p> <p>Board member, Jose Salazar, questioned why there is a 4 hour difference for the EMT level, 36 hours for Virginia as opposed to 40 hours for the National Registry. Greg Neiman from OEMS explained that the CE Workgroup discussed the hours and decided that in Virginia providers could choose to maintain their Virginia certification or meet the National Registry certification requirements.</p> <p>Mr. Salazar is concerned about the long-term affect for Virginia EMTs, especially if they decide to move to another state which requires National Registry certification and they will not be qualified.</p> <p>Board member, Sherrin Alsop, a representative of Virginia Association of Counties, said that King and Queen County has a hard time finding EMTs and Paramedics. She expressed concern about the change in hours especially because they have a hard time finding classes in order to obtain their CEUs..</p> <p>Mr. Critzer asked Greg Neiman if all of the Category 1 and Category 2 hours for EMT recertification with the exception of the practical skill hours are available through online classes. Mr. Neiman said that is correct. Mr. Critzer told Ms. Alsop that they can sit down with her after the meeting to help her determine how they can provide training for her area.</p> <p>After extensive discussion, Matt Tatum made a motion to amend the original motion to mirror the National Registry requirements. The motion was seconded and the Chair called for a vote on the amended motion.</p> <p>The Chair said the original motion, as amended, is now back on the floor for a vote. Mr. Critzer asked if there was any further discussion on the original motion before the vote is taken.</p> <p>Chip Decker said he feels it is bad to toss the work of the committee who has been working on this issue for months in just a few minutes. He suggested instead sending the motion back to the committee for more review. Mr. Critzer said that if there is a desire to kill the motion it needs to be either voted down or postpone the motion indefinitely.</p> <p>Steve Elliott made a motion that the original motion be postponed indefinitely.
