






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
The TB (tuberculosis) vaccine won't always protect you. You're still at risk for getting TB. So, if you got the vaccine and now have these symptoms, it's time to see a doctor. Ask yourself:

- Do you have a cough that won't go away?
 This is often the first sign of TB.
- Have you lost weight?
- Do you have night sweats?
- Are you always tired?

If yes — call your doctor or health department. TB can be treated and cured.


