UPDATED RECOMMENDATIONS FOR TUBERCULOSIS (TB) SCREENING, TESTING, AND TREATMENT

for health care personnel in the United States.

What are the updated recommendations?

Before starting a new job in a health care setting, all workers and volunteers should receive

TB individual risk assessment

Symptom screening

TB test

An annual TB test is not recommended unless there is a known exposure or ongoing transmission.

All health care personnel should receive TB education every year. Treatment for latent TB infection (LTBI) is strongly encouraged for health care personnel diagnosed with LTBI.

Shorter treatment regimens should be used.
