Virginia General Assembly 101

- 400 Years of Self Governance
 - O 1619-2019
- O Divided into the Senate and House of Delegates 140 Members
 - O Senate 40 Members that each represent roughly 200,000 people
 - O House 100 Members that each represent roughly 80,000 people
- Biggest fights are typically regional, not partisan
- Constitutionally obligated to balance the budget

Legislative Process 101

- Process is done in 45 days in the odd years and 60 days in the even years
 - O 2019 Session was 45 days
 - O Jan 9 Feb 23
 - O 2020 Session will be 60 days
 - O Jan 8 March 7

Connecting with Legislators

- O Legislators are People
 - O Become a friendly advisor
- O Befriend your Legislator before you need your Legislator
 - O If they know you and know that you can work with them, they will more easily work with you

Connecting with Legislators

- Legislators are Part-Time Positions
 - O Most have full-time jobs in addition to this role
- Legislators can only be an expert on so many things.
 - O Having constituents with knowledge on other subjects is helpful
 - O You may have to "dumb it down" for non-experts
- Legislative Assistants (LA's)
 - O Gatekeepers
 - O Can be a huge asset to you

- Bankers/Finance/Insurance (3 members / 2.17%)
- Business People (31 members / 22.46%)
- Educators (14 members / 10.14%)
- Farmers/Agriculture (5 members / 3.62%)
- Lawyers (34 members / 24.64%)
- Medical Professions (13 members / 9.42%)
- Military/Defense (5 members / 3.62%)
- Nonprofit and Community Workers (6 members / 4.35%)
- Public Affairs/Lobbyists (8 members / 5.80%)
- Public Employees (8 members / 5.80%)
- Transportation (1 members / 0.72%)
- Other (10 members / 7.25%)

Before Session (Oct – 1st week of Jan)

- O Before Session, most bills are written and worked out
 - O If you have an idea, reach out to your legislator during this time
 - O The earlier, the better
 - Often, legislators have more time to discuss the issues during this time

During Session (Jan – Feb or Mar)


- During this time, schedules are incredibly fast paced
 - O Work days for legislators can go from 6:00 AM 10:00 PM with dozens of meetings
 - O When meeting with a legislator during session, be succinct and pleasant
 - O Have a one page info sheet
- After the first full week of session, no new legislation can be introduced
 - O Get your ideas in before session, or the very first week
- Promoting your Bill
 - Get Strategic Co-Patrons on your bills
 - O Get lobbyist/organizational support

During Session – Committee Testimony

- If a bill that you are concerned about is before a committee, you can testify on it.
 - O In VA, any citizen can speak on a bill at committee.
 - O This is the only chance to speak to members (other than individual emails/calls/letters/etc.)
- Committees move very fast
 - O Bills heard in a certain meeting will be announced the day before at the earliest


Tracking Bills


- VirginiaGeneralAssembly.gov has many great resources

 - O Search by bill number
 - Click on Member Listings to search member's bill lists
- Virginia's Legislative Information System (LIS. Virginia. Gov) allows for searches by subject, members, and bill numbers




Tracking an Individual Bill

2019 Elections



- November 5, 2019 may shake things up
 - O All 140 Members are up for election this year.
 - O Currently, the House is 51-49
 - O The Senate is 21-19
 - O If control changes hands in one or both chambers, there will be a transition period
- The party in power will get more legislation passed
 - O If you have a bill idea, going to a member in that party is better (if possible)
