Why: operating informally vs as a non profit to benefit the public

Pros:

- Tax-exempt status
- Limited liability to members
- Opens access to grants reserved for non profit
- Enter into contracts

VSSTF Business Non Profit Status: Needs, Pros and Cons

<u>Cons:</u>

- Lack of funds to support expenses,
- Dependency on donations and grants for funds
- Need to maintain compliance with documentation for starting and maintaining the non profit status
- File annual reports, and need an accountant and lawyer
- Need a registered agent
- Can miss deadlines and lose tax status
- Public scrutiny
- have restrictions on lobbying and political activities, impact advocacy
