




Ukrainians

Program Planning and Partnership

- Meeting with Refugee Health Coordinator at Tennessee Office for Refugees (TOR).
- Concern from TOR was that state refugee health clinics would not be able to accommodate the volume in the required timeframe.
- Solution was for local health departments to absorb the influx and provide testing.
 - TOR communicated to all refugee health clinics to refer individuals to their local health departments.






U4U Funding


- Three (3) rounds of funding.
 - Total amount received: \$303,464
- Expenditures
 - QFT supplies
 - Translation services
 - Outpatient QFT services
 - Supplies for rapid molecular susceptibility testing at the state lab?





Cubans, Haitians, Nicaraguans, & Venezuelans









Data Summary (as of 10/16/23)

Total Tested (N=1,063)






QFT % Positivity




Chest X-rays





Evaluation and Treatment

- Total QFT-positive: 69
 - Fully evaluated: 48 (69.6%)
 - Reasons not evaluated: refused (2), lost to follow-up (1), moved (1)
