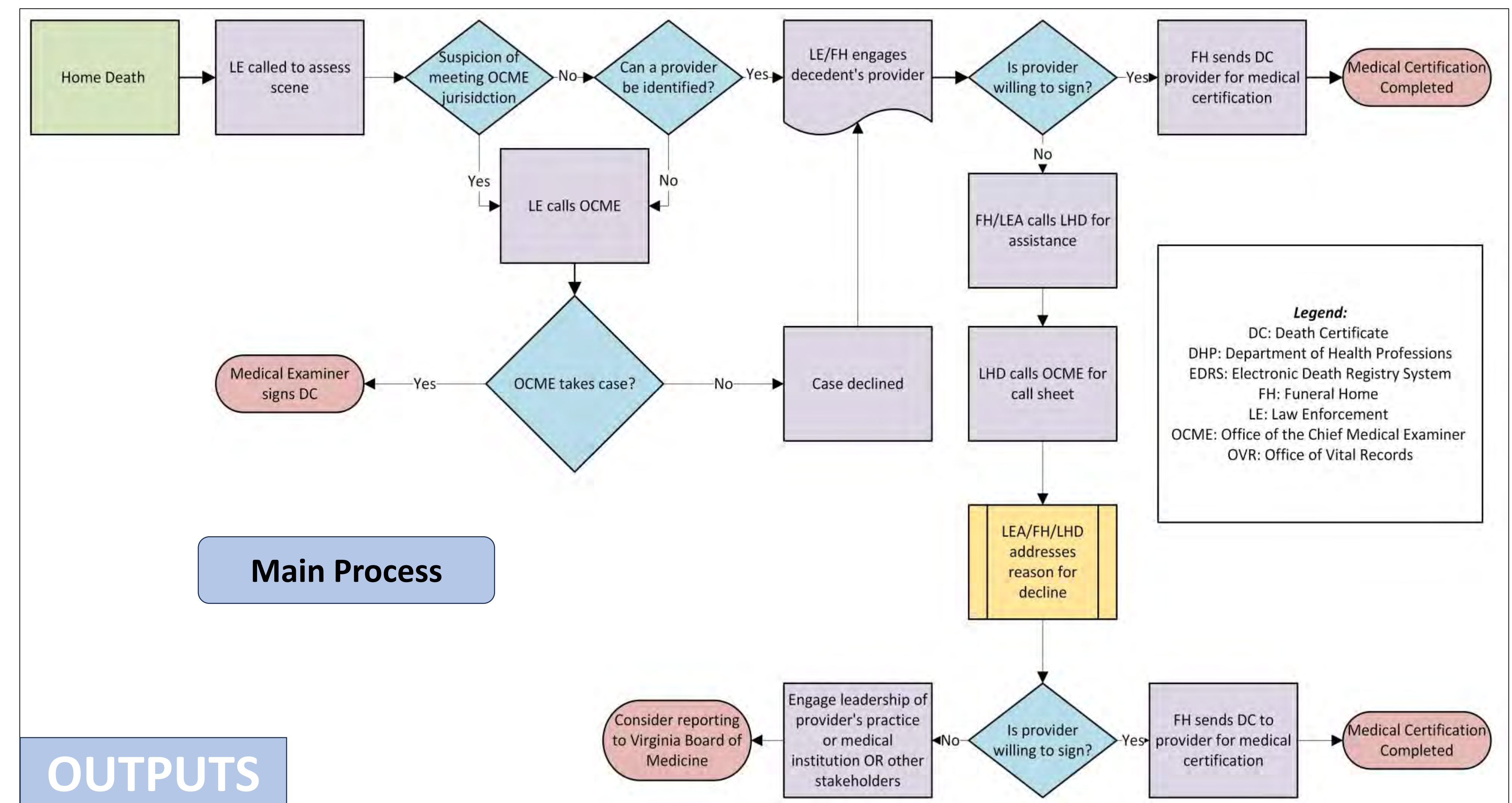


IDENTIFYING THE ISSUE

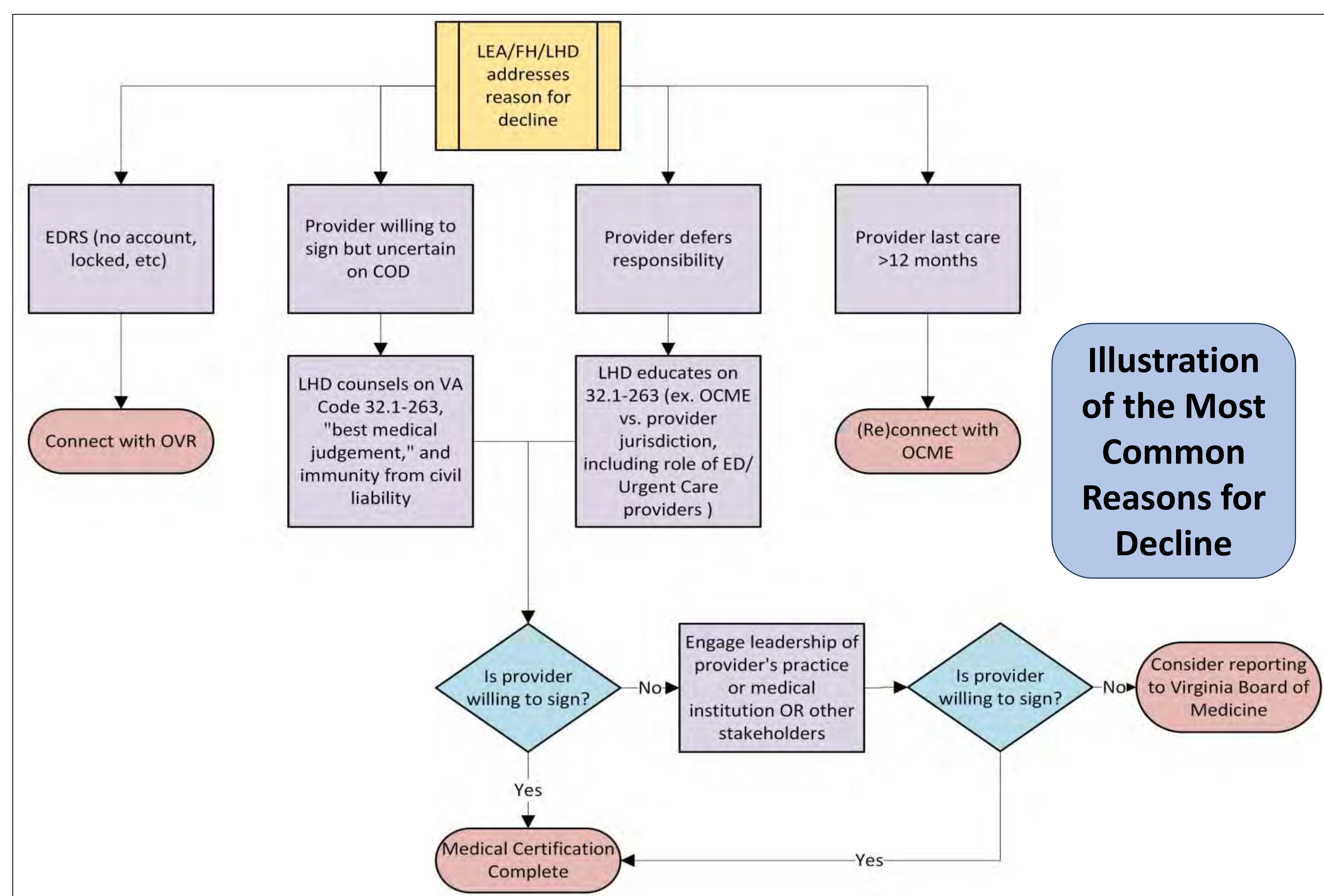
Timely medical certification of death certificates is essential to the planning of funeral and memorial services and managing the affairs of the decedent. **From start to finish, completing a death certificate requires the involvement of at least three to five different agencies.** Reducing the barriers to medical certification reduces the distress of already grieving families and ensures that the public receives timely assistance.

- Analyze both qualitative & quantitative data to determine barriers to timely completion of death certificates (e.g., 30+ email requests for assistance from FCHD).
- Organize **group, individual, and interagency** discussions with stakeholders:
OVR, OCME, DHP, FCPD, NOVA Funeral Homes & LHD Directors, FCHD Informatics
- Consolidate feedback from stakeholders to create comprehensive recommendations.

ACKNOWLEDGEMENTS

Stakeholders' insights were visualized onto a comprehensive **process map that illustrates this complex workflow. Main causes of delay, as reported to FCHD, was a lack of understanding about VA Code 32.1 and more specifically, lack of knowledge about a provider's immunity from civil liability when using their "best medical judgement" to certify a cause of death and the importance of timely completion of the certificate.**

1. Proactive Education & Trainings

For providers: develop an outline for a 2026-2027 mandatory continuing medical education (**CME**) training for Virginia licensed providers responsible for certifying deaths.
For funeral homes: develop a "**guidebook**" for natural death protocol with flowchart of FAQs and promoting existing resources.

2. Code Cleanup

Submit recommendations for code edits to remove inconsistencies in language (e.g., explicitly specifying which kind of providers can or cannot sign).

3. Health Information Exchange (HIE)

Explore opportunities for more efficient sharing of decedent's health and/or provider information for quicker medical certification of DCs.

RECOMMENDATIONS

1. **A consistent problem with low individual frequency.** Stakeholder buy-in and engagement is a priority.

2. There is **no one governing entity** monitoring the process, increasing the need for closer collaboration between stakeholders. Increasing the timely certification of death certificates requires **interagency** partnerships at local and state levels.

3. **Resource limitations** slow down the exchange of up-to-date information to all involved.
