ACEP has received funding from several sources to work on this project. They met with a consultant recently and are starting to initiate some focus groups in an effort to review several areas concerning OMDs. They will be looking into what makes an individual become an OMD; what groups of physicians are not being tapped into; and what are the possible obstacles to becoming an OMD. ACEP is also looking at its own membership and focusing on approaching ACEP members about becoming OMDs.
