VI. Special Reports	a. Neonatal Resuscitation Training – Dr. Joe Khoury – VCU Neonatology Dr. Khoury is the Medical Director for Transport and part of his job is outreach. They do NRP training with staff at several hospitals in the State. They also do training with EMS agencies. Dr. Khoury would like to set up training at this level on neonatal resuscitation. He has reached out to the Office of EMS for data on neonatal, pregnancy and delivery calls for two years. There was a significant number of calls. The committee agreed that there is a huge need for this training. How do you train 36,000 providers? It was suggested using a Train the Trainer method. Could this be a special RSAF grant initiative? Yes, it possibly could. This should be a hands-on course due to intubations. A PowerPoint was shown and there was great interest in this.	
VII. Old Business	The committee received an update on Dr. Sullivan's hospital who has patients waiting outside in the ambulance for long periods of time. This is still an ongoing issue with other hospitals across the state. Office of Licensure and Certification will be invited to speak on this at an upcoming meeting. Gary suggested that this could be a main topic at the Executive Committee meeting on February 2.	
VIII. New Business	a. Patient Care Committees – Dr. Amir Louka A Pediatric Care Committee was established for PEMS and has been extraordinarily successful. Pediatric protocols were created. Is this something that other regions are doing? Do you feel that this is a need? Dr. Brand stated that they have a Peds Committee. Dr. Yee said that in ODEMSA, they reach out to the Directors of the Peds ED to review protocols. If anyone is interested in this, please reach out to Dr. Louka. Emergency Operations – Karen Owens</li> <li>Karen stated that Covid, pneumonia, flu, Ebola are real and the health department is actively engaged in planning and information gathering for each of these. Kari has been working with agencies to see if there are Ebola capable as defined by the CDC. Free Covid tests and free PPE are no longer available. Karen stated that the Emergency Management formed a workgroup to look at whether Virginia should teach SALT or START or both and the workgroup also looked at updating the triage tags. The workgroup recommended that Virginia should only teach SALT – Sort, Assess Lifesaving Intervention and Treatment Transport. They also felt that Virginia should still use a standardized triage tag which should be redesigned. Karen and Kari are here to get feedback on these recommendations. Dr. Yee stated that the concept of SALT has been a long time coming; however, the triage tag is very busy. Northern Virginia prefers START. The committee members gave feedback on the tags. Tag use should be decided at the agency level or at regional levels and should be optional. Many agencies will not use them.</li> <li>f. ## Administration of Patient Supplied Medications

#### Administration of Patient Supplied Medications

Prehospital clinicians may be requested to administer medications that the patient has been prescribed and keeps at home to allow urgent treatment of unusual conditions that require medications that would not usually be carried in typical EMS drug kits.

Examples include:

hydrocortisone (Solu Cortef) for the management of adrenal insufficiency, which may occur in condition such as Congenital Adrenal Hyperplasia (CAH)

complement (C1) esterase inhibitors (Haegarda, Cinryze ) for the management of hereditary angioedema

coagulation factor concentrates (Factor VIII or Factor IX) for the management of hemophilia

#### For patients and their care-givers:

Patients who might require the administration of home medications are encouraged to contact the EMS agency that will respond when they call 911 and develop a "pre-plan" for administration of medications that they keep at home.

This plan should include detailed instruction on the reconstitution and administration of the medication and a note from the prescribing physician that will be available to the EMS clinicians responding.

#### For EMS clinicians and Medical Directors:

Any medications to be administered should have detailed directions available to emergency responders for reconstitution and administration. A note from the prescribing physician would be preferred as well.

The medication and route of administration must be within the Scope of Practice of the administering EMS clinician.

EMS clinicians should make early use of on-line medical command for assistance, if required, in these situations. The agency medical director may be of most assistance as they are most likely to be familiar with the EMS clinicians, their scope of practice, and any "pre-plan" developed with the EMS agency.

#### Background

The Virginia EMS Scholarship Program is managed by the Virginia Office of Emergency Medical Services providing scholarship awards to current Virginia EMS Providers and those seeking to become EMS providers in the Commonwealth.


The scholarship program supports students who are accepted into an eligible Virginia approved initial certification program–EMR, EMT, Advanced EMT and Paramedic.

The scholarship program is not designed to provide 100% funding for a training program.

#### FY23 Scholarship Budget


The FY23 budget for the Virginia EMS Scholarship Program is \$2,000,000.00. The following chart shows a breakdown of funding based on three (3) categories: 1) Applications Pending Approval, 2) Total Scholarship \$ Awarded, and Remaining Funds.

- **Application Pending Approval** this category includes the total dollar value for all applications received through December 31, 2022. This covers Q1 &2.
- Total Scholarship \$ Awarded this category is the total dollar value for all scholarship applications which have been approved and are in the process of being paid. Since the Virginia EMS Scholarship module is new, OEMS staff have only approved a small group of test applications as we work through the payment processes with the VDH Office of Financial Management.
- **Remaining Funds** this category is the total dollar value of funds remaining in the scholarship program and available for to students for the remainder of the fiscal year.



#### **Breakdown of Pending Applications**



Total # of Applicants by Level




#### **Breakdown of Awarded Scholarships**
