

Blacklegged Tick










TIMES OF YEAR WHEN TICK STAGES IN VIRGINIA ARE ACTIVE

^{***}Incubation period and illness: An incubation period is the time it takes for symptoms to appear after a person is infected. For more information about symptoms of these tickborne diseases, go to www.vdh.virginia.gov/ticks.

¹Gulf Coast Ticks: These ticks are found sporadically in Virginia and only the large adult stage ticks bite people.

²Brown Dog Ticks: These ticks are uncommon in Virginia and are only found in doghouses, kennels, and on the walls of other structures that dogs live in.
