A *BRIEF* History of MRC in Virginia

- ★ National MRC program began in 2002 in Response to 9/11 and anthrax attacks Oct 2001
- ★ The Virginia MRC program started in September 2003 with 12 units, and presently expanded to 25 units
- ★ Virginia Board of Health Declaration of Interest in the MRC Program in 2005
- ★ In 2006, the Virginia Law began providing MRC with Risk Management Liability Coverage

MRC Volunteer Application Approval

- ★ Prospective MRC Volunteers complete an application form at www.vamrc.org and submit:
 - Profile Picture
 - Contact Information
 - Driver's License information
 - Medical License/Credentials, if applicable
- ★ Medical credentials are checked against DHP database
- ★ Volunteer completes Orientation (online or in-person)
- ★ Background Investigation is initiated (Same BI as VDH Employees)
- ★ Once BI results approved, provided a Volunteer Identification Badge and is now a "Deployable" MRC Volunteer

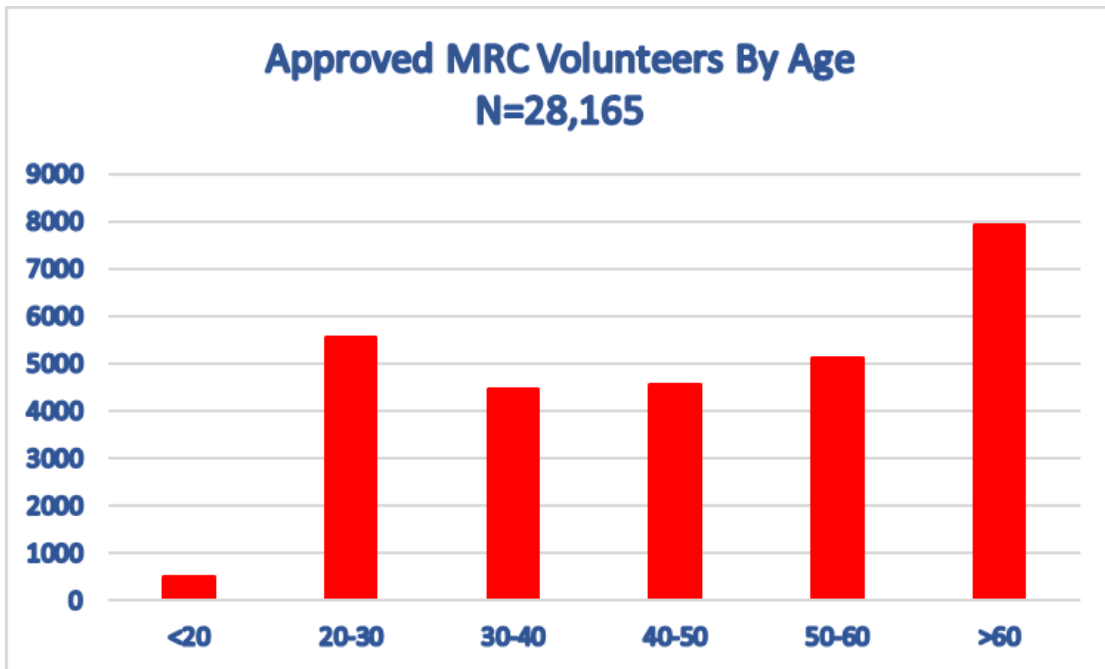

- ★ All deployable MRC Volunteers have medical credentials check, background investigation and orientation training
- ★ TRAIN Virginia Accounts
- ★ Additional Training Plans
 - Vaccine Competency (Same as PHNs)
 - Case Investigator Training Plan (#5804)
 - VDH Shelter Training for Nurses
 - Fit Testing Train-the-Trainer
 - REVIVE
- ★ MRC Unit Specific Training
- ★ Statewide MRC Training
- ★ Just-in-Time Training

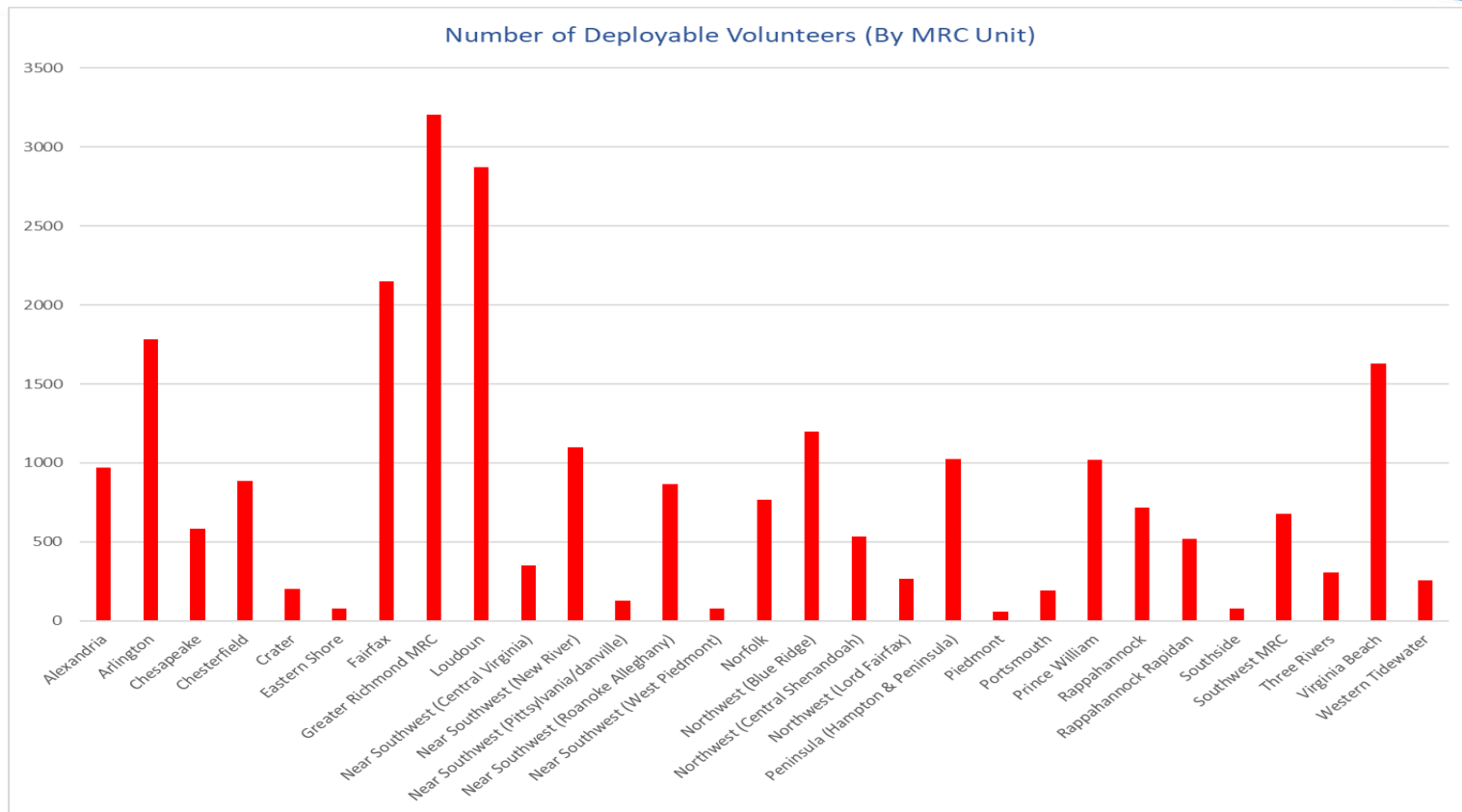

Some VVHS Features

- ★ Volunteers self-register and can update their own contact information to keep it current
- ★ MRC Unit Coordinators can assign Volunteers to Roles and Groups to enable rapid deployment of trained and ready volunteers for specific jobs
- ★ VVHS has a built-in, rapid, mass alerting system similar to HAN/Everbridge
- ★ Volunteers can select their own shifts
- ★ Unit Coordinators can quickly compile shift rosters

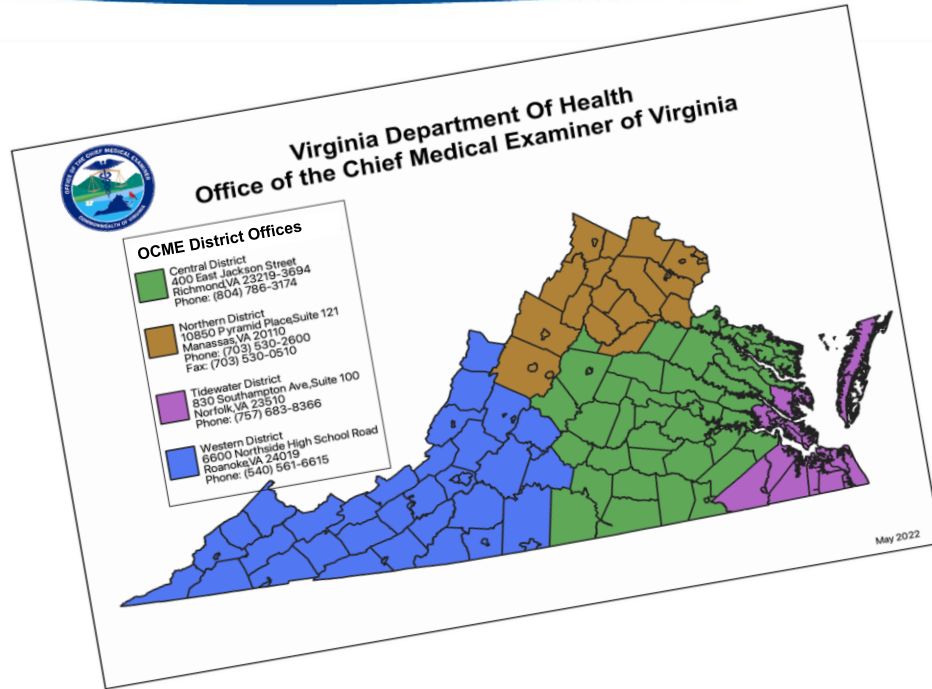

Support Roles for Non-Mass Fatality Events			
Name	Description	Working Unit	Essential Responsibilities/ Activities
Medicolegal Death Investigator Assistant	Assist MDIs with medical and LE record requests, answering/responding to specific phone calls (FHs, family members, non-DOA cases). Administrative Tasks	MDI	Manage files, request medical records, etc.
Administrative Assistant	Assist admin with filing, answering phones, processing requests.	Admin	Processing Documents & Requests, special projects; assort library records.
Autopsy Assistant	Assist forensic autopsy technicians and forensic pathologists with daily operations. Assist the morgue with taking photography. Assist technicians with organization of toxicology and supplies and restock of the morgue area.	Morgue Services	Cleaning, organizing, re-stocking, body manipulation (assist in autopsies), administrative task, file organizing. Laundry, assist in body release.
