




# **Ongoing Monitored Situations**

- Measles cases grow slowly. The CDC detected 71 new cases across the nation in March. Since the start of April only four new cases were detected, with none reported last week. Cases remain geographically sporadic. Los Angeles reports a possible exposure event that includes the Universal Studios theme park.
- No new mpox cases in Virginia this week. The Commonwealth reported 17 new mpox cases since the start of the year, but only one of these cases was detected in April. Health officials in neighboring North Carolina report that over 20 individuals were exposed to the virus at an elementary school in Charlotte.
- Spread of avian influenza in dairy cattle continues. The virus was recently detected in three new herds in Michigan, Responding to this situation, 17 states have restricted importation of cattle from affected states.
- Canada reports avian flu in wild mammals. The H5N5 virus, not to be confused with the H5N1 flu affecting cattle, was found in wild raccoons on Prince Edward Island an in Nova Scotia.
- Norovirus remains stabilize as rotavirus decreases. Data from the NREVSS suggest that norovirus activity in the Southern U.S. Census region (which includes Virginia) has likely stabilized. Rotavirus detections in the region peaked in March and are likely on a declining trajectory. Wastewater data suggests that activity for both viruses remains elevated nationwide.




Norovirus in Southern U.S. Census Region (Includes Virginia)

 Seasonal respiratory diseases slowly decreasing. For the sixth week in a row, emergency department (ED) and urgent care diagnoses of influenza have fallen in Virginia. COVID-19 diagnoses in the ED have decreased consistently since February. Combined hospitalizations have fallen by 75% since December but remain elevated compared to summer lows. Adults over 70 remain the most impacted. Models suggest that admissions will continue a slow decline.



# **Pandemic Preparedness**

- The 194 member states of the World Health Organization are approaching two years of negotiations on a potential pandemic agreement that aims to help countries "prevent, prepare for and respond to pandemics" through improved international cooperation. Although the final text is expected to be voted on at the May 2024 World Health Assembly, a satisfactory agreement between member nations is unlikely.
- The Biden administration announced the Global Health Security Strategy earlier this week. The initiative focuses on offering US support to 50 countries, primarily in Africa and Asia, to improve their testing, surveillance, and communication capabilities, and increase their preparedness for future disease outbreaks. The administration is prepared to implement the strategy regardless of the outcome of the pandemic agreement negotiations.

#### **Other News**

- Over 320 drugs are in <u>short supply</u> across the country, the highest shortage recorded since 2001.
   According to a <u>2023 survey</u> conducted by the American Society of Health-System Pharmacists, the record shortage of 323 drugs includes critical chemotherapy and life-saving crash cart drugs. Many manufacturers have not provided an <u>explanation</u> for the shortage.
- The Virginia Hospital and Healthcare Association launches the new "Help Us, Help You" public awareness campaign to address the increased risk of workplace violence among healthcare workers. The series of videos emphasize the importance of respectful behavior to ensure the accessibility of safe and high-quality health care.
- Following a 2020 study on heat islands, Roanoke organizations embarked on the H.O.P.E. for Heat Resilience project, a collaborative approach to urban planning that prioritizes heat resilience. Several community-based organizations met with consultants from the EPA this week as they prepare to apply for funding for future projects through EPA's Community Change Grant.

• Seven homicides have been reported in the Richmond area since the beginning of the month. This comes after a decrease in the number of homicides during the first quarter of 2024. Most recently, a 16-year-old boy was killed, and four others injured in a Fulton Hill shooting earlier this week. The boy is the fourth juvenile to be killed in April.
