

# **Key Takeaways**


- H5N1 bird flu has been detected in 36 dairy cattle herds in nine states, but wastewater and retail milk testing suggest the outbreak in dairy cattle may be more widespread.

# **Ongoing Monitored Situations**

### **Seasonal Illnesses**

- Respiratory illness activity levels of COVID-19 and flu continue to decrease and are now at the lowest level seen since July and November 2023 respectively. RSV rates are near zero.
- Hospital admissions for COVID-19 and flu reach eight-month low. Combined admissions are now at a level not seen since August 2023. Models suggest that hospital admissions may stabilize through June.
- Norovirus unchanged, rotavirus rates decreasing.
   Data from the Southern U.S. Census Region, which includes Virginia, show that norovirus activity remains elevated. Rotavirus detections, which peaked at the end of March, have <u>fallen by 85%</u> since then.


#### GI Illness in the Southern U.S. Census Region (Includes Virginia)




Rotavirus activity is decreasing in the American South. Data Source: CDC.

### **Measles**

 Measles outbreaks continue both nationally and globally. The CDC reported seven new national cases of measles in April. This is down from 70 in March. The WHO has reported over 100,000 global cases in 2024, with most of these cases found in developing nations.

## **Mpox**

- Mpox cases continue in Virginia. A total of <u>20 mpox</u> <u>cases</u> have been reported in the Commonwealth since the start of 2024, including four in April.
- A <u>CDC assessment</u> found that the risk posed by clade I mpox to the general population in the United States is 'very low'. The same assessment found a 'low to moderate' risk to American men who have sex with men (MSM). An <u>outbreak</u> of the more virulent clade I mpox is presently impacting the Democratic Republic of Congo.

# HPAI A(H5N1) Bird Flu

- Last week <u>H5N1 bird flu</u> was <u>detected</u> in a Colorado dairy herd, bringing the total to 36 herds in nine states. <u>Wastewater</u> and <u>retail milk testing</u> now <u>suggests</u> that the outbreak could be more widespread in dairy cattle than previously thought.
- Infected cats were likely exposed by drinking raw milk on dairy farms. The FDA reaffirmed the safety of pasteurized milk; testing milk and milk-derived products did not detect any 'live' infectious virus. A 2022 survey found that 4.4% of Americans reported consuming raw milk in the past year, including 1% who consumed raw milk at least once per week.
- The UN Food and Agriculture Organization in Vietnam <u>urged</u> countries to monitor for an H5N1 reassortment. Reassortment between new and old clades has been detected in parts of Asia. It has been linked to human infections, but at this time there is no evidence of increased severity or infectivity in mammals, including humans.

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# **Spotlight**

## Other News

- National Hurricane Preparedness Week is May 5-11, 2024. The Atlantic basin is forecast to have 11 hurricanes, including five major hurricanes, this season. Unseasonably high air and record sea-surface temperatures are increasing the chances of an active and potentially severe hurricane season.
- A <u>recent review</u> found that many physicians feel less obligated to treat infectious disease patients. Although most physicians felt obligated to offer treatment, some cited that <u>labor rights and worker protections</u> could be reasons to refuse.
- Nine people died and 65 required treatment in an overdose outbreak in Austin, TX. Fentanyl was detected among all nine deaths, but the majority had other drugs in their systems as well.
- Over 80% of national emergency call centers are experiencing staff shortages according to a recent report. The shortages, exacerbated by outdated technology, have contributed to mandatory overtime and symptoms of burnout.

# **Campus Protests**

- Protests related to the conflict in Israel and Palestine have broken out on campuses across the U.S. Many of these have involved encampments or sit-ins (see map). <u>Muslim</u>, <u>Jewish</u>, and <u>other</u> students have reported feeling unsafe due to the protests, counter-protests, and <u>other</u> incidents.
- Response to these protests has been <u>mixed</u>. Some universities have <u>successfully negotiated</u> with protest leaders, while others have <u>called</u> in police to <u>forcibly remove encampments</u>. In many cases protesters have resisted, sometimes violently, or <u>escalated</u> civil disobedience following dispersal. Injuries among protestors and <u>law enforcement</u> have been <u>reported</u>, but have been limited.
- Violence between protestors and counterprotesters has been reported in at least two incidents. At <u>UCLA</u>, a group of similarly dressed and masked individuals initiated an assault on a protest encampment, resulting in at least 15 injuries. Two people were injured during an altercation at the University of California – Berkeley.



Preliminary data shows fatal drug overdose continued to be the leading method of unnatural death in Virginia in Q3 2023. Fentanyl is responsible for over 75% of fatal overdoses. Rates vary across the state, with the highest rates in Southern and Western Virginia.

• The White House signed a <u>memorandum</u> to protect critical infrastructure. The memorandum empowers the US Dept of Homeland Security to secure critical infrastructure, and directs the US Intelligence Community to share intelligence with Federal, state, local, and private partners. <u>Healthcare and Public Health</u> is one of the 16 critical infrastructure <u>sectors</u>.
